Introduction

The former railway stop of Robinson is located at km 139 on the South Klondike Highway (formerly known as Mile 11.1 on the Carcross Road) and Milepost 89.9 on the White Pass and Yukon Railway. It lies within the traditional territories of the Carcross Tagish First Nation and Kwanlin Dün First Nation. The site was named after William “Stikine Bill” Robinson, a veteran railway builder and a colourful character who – at six foot three inches and 300 pounds – was literally larger than life. During construction of the White Pass and Yukon Railway, he supervised the freighting of construction materials by horse-drawn carts and barge from the White Pass to various locations along the line. He was also in charge of laying the grade between Bennett and Whitehorse.

Unlike the nearby stops of Lorne and Cowley, which boasted two-storey section houses, the railway put little or no infrastructure at this site other than a siding. Robinson did not come into prominence until 1906 when gold discoveries in the Wheaton valley led to a staking rush. This was accompanied by the boundless optimism that envisioned instant and long-term future prosperity in the area. A government road was built from Robinson to the new diggings and William Grainger and H.W. Vance staked a townsite occupying 320 acres at Robinson. Entrepreneur Lewis Napoleon Markle (also known as Louis or simply L.N.) immediately arranged to dig a well and start building a roadhouse.

Louis Markle soon left, selling the roadhouse to his wife, Catherine Markle. In 1907, Grainger died tragically from carbon monoxide poisoning while working in a mine in the Whitehorse Copper Belt. Vance moved on within a few years and the roadhouse became part of a ranch operated by Charles “Charlie” McConnell. Nonetheless the administrative records of the would-be townsite persisted for many years, later hampering Charles McConnell and Mrs. Markle from homesteading the same area [YA, GOV 1960, f. 827]. Nonetheless, McConnell made many improvements to the site and further expanded his holdings in 1909 when he acquired a 100-acre homestead about six miles to the west on a property

initially developed by Herman Olson. McConnell was involved in many enterprises: mining, freighting, farming, ranching, cutting and milling timber, and operating the roadhouse.

In 1908, a road was completed from Whitehorse to Carcross and a post office opened at Robinson. White Pass had built a siding where freight cars were loaded with ore from the Wheaton valley mines. For many years, there was an old caboose at the siding, used as a station and a mail drop after the post office closed in 1915.

During Alaska Highway construction in 1942-43, Robinson was occupied by a US Army work camp and sawmill. The machinery may have belonged to McConnell, who had refurbished his old mill in 1941.

From 1906 to the 1950s, the *Whitehorse Star* diligently recorded a surprising number of comings and goings to this seemingly remote locale. Robinson was a hub for the miners in the Wheaton River area, and geologists checking out the mining prospects or dropping off their horses to overwinter at McConnell's Ranch. It was a centre for woodcutters, trappers, big game outfitters, waterfowl hunters, and visitors spending a few days with Charlie McConnell and his wife Florence. According to Laurent Cyr, White Pass pastured horses here that were used on the winter Overland Trail to Dawson. Thousands of tonnes of ore were transferred from horse-drawn carts – and later trucks – to the railway at this little siding. It was the site of cattle sales, a trial, the capture of lost dogs and an escaped criminal, and even a rest stop for the mysterious Lillian Alling during her odyssey from New York toward Siberia. Although a large US Army camp was based here during the building of the Alaska Highway, little information is readily available about that time. In 1953, hundreds of people boarded BYN busses bound for Robinson to attend a day of picnicking and activities hosted by the Bartenders Union.

Unfortunately, the *Star* did not record the travels of the First Nations families in the area. Although the Robinson flag station and roadhouse were not established until the early 1900s, this area had long been a crossroads of First Nation travel routes. People travelled from Fish Lake southwest of Whitehorse overland to Robinson and from there to Tagish, Caribou Crossing and even over the mountain passes to the Pacific coast. Other routes led west to Kusawa and Dezadeash lakes. More recently, we know that several families were hunting and trapping in this area including Kitty and Billy Smith, the Burns family Albert Sam, Eva Sam, and Mary Billy. Robinson marked one of the boundaries of the hunting territory of noted big game outfitter Johnnie Johns. More research is required to obtain a fuller account of these stories as well as the indigenous names for landmarks in the area.

Some Robinson Personalities

Kitty and Billy Smith

Kitty Smith (ca. 1890-1989), a renowned Yukon storyteller and artist, spent much of her married life at Robinson. At the time she met him, her second husband Billy Smith was hunting and trapping in the Robinson area with his partners John Joe and Kitty's maternal uncle Charlie Brown. When Billy asked to marry Kitty, he promised to build a home at Robinson for her and her grandmother. With help from Charlie Burns, he built a house using lumber purchased from Matthew Watson's General Store in Carcross. He then sent Kitty \$100 to buy furnishings. In 1916, she took the train to Robinson with her purchases: bed, heater, cook stove, chairs, dishes, washtub. "All!"

She later related, "Trainman called out, 'There's your house, Mrs. Billy Smith!'"

Billy and Kitty spent several years in the Robinson and Carcross area. She gave birth to a number of her children during this time. They hunted at *Ddhäl Nàdhäda* – Robinson Mountain. She later related: “Used to be big meat hunts there. Lots of people – Slim Jim, Laberge Bill, John Joe – on top of that mountain.”¹

Kitty cooked at the Carcross Hotel for four years while her husband worked on hunting parties. They operated a gold mine in the Wheaton River area for nearly 10 years. She later recounted: “ ‘Shininook,’ they call it: ‘he gets up.’ My husband’s uncle was Skookum Jim, so I guess he’s got to look for gold. My sons worked it with him. They worked the creek. We got a big house. We got hydraulic . . . But that main creek is no good.”

While on the Wheaton, a particular poplar tree caught her imagination and prompted her to begin carving. She became well-known as a carver, inspired by mythological themes. Today her carvings can be seen at MacBride Museum, Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centre, Da Kų Cultural Centre in Haines Junction, and in the Yukon Permanent Art Collection.

When the Alaska Highway came through, Billy and Kitty were trapping at Robinson. They had trouble crediting the rumours of the big highway being built from Edmonton. Billy ended up being one of the guides for road construction crews between Whitehorse and Watson Lake. Kitty recalled the US Army setting up a large camp at Robinson, “over one hundred working people.” Kitty and her family prospered by selling hide and fur clothing to the soldiers, earning enough to buy a truck.²

Lewis Napoleon & Catherine Markle

Based on numerous mentions in the *Whitehorse Star*, Louis Markle seemed to have had a restless entrepreneurial spirit with big dreams and an inability to settle down long enough to carry them through. Within three years, Markle took part in three mineral rushes: to the Kluane area in 1904, to Conrad in 1905, where he purchased a lot planning to build a restaurant; and to the Wheaton river area in 1906. During that same period of time, he was involved in various businesses: the Royal restaurant in Whitehorse (ca. 1902-03) and a draying business in 1904 after his return from Kluane. By August 1905, he had bought a hotel at Bennett with plans to move it to Carcross. In March 1906, he was proprietor of the Bon Ton Café, which boasted a telephone so that “all orders by it will be promptly prepared.” Four months later, he had moved to Robinson, where in July 1906, he applied for a hotel license and made plans to dig a well and build a roadhouse in the townsite staked by Vance and Grainger. By November of that same year, he had moved on to Skagway where he was again “engaged in the restaurant business” and apparently estranged from his wife.

Catherine Markle was equally enterprising and adventurous. She and her two small sons followed her husband north from Seattle in 1903. She even made a trip to Bullion Creek with her husband and two dogs, hauling 800 pounds of freight in a small wagon. She was an accomplished cook, working in a few Whitehorse restaurants including the Vancouver café. She took ownership of the Dominion Hotel in August 1907.

A few months later, in November 1907, she purchased the Robinson Roadhouse, likely from her husband, and announced plans to build a new large up-to-date facility. The following April, she and her

two sons moved out to Robinson to take charge of the roadhouse. The nature of her partnership with Charles McConnell is unclear but the two made an unsuccessful application for a pair of adjoining homesteads at the Robinson site in 1913. After seven years at Robinson, Mrs. Markle moved to Skagway in March 1915 to operate a restaurant. The following November she married Skagway resident Charles Nye.

In October 1915, the *Fairbanks Times* reported that L.N. Markle had gone “broke” at Iditarod but was scheming to make a comeback by shipping ten tons of vegetables to the mining camp. A year later, he married his sister-in-law, Mrs. Bertha Markle of Minnesota, who only met her husband in person for the first time upon her arrival in Anchorage. Markle’s two grown-up sons, William and Charles, were reported as living in Skagway with their mother, now Mrs. Charles Nye.³

Charles McConnell

“Mr. McConnell . . . has been continually residing in the neighborhood since 1907, operating a roadhouse, farming, ranching, freighting, and mining, and is the type of man so dearly needed in this Territory and he should be encouraged by all means to remain here.”

– Percy Reid, Crown Timber and Land Agent, 1926 July 12 [YA, GOV 1960, f. 827]

“He hewed his living from the Yukon Hills in mining, wood-cutting, lumbering, and all the activities the out-of-doors offered. He never saw Skagway and never took a trip “outside”; he took great pride in this. A real HE MAN was Charlie, and we hope he finds a place in Valhalla where his unusual talents will be appreciated. Certain it is that his name will long be remembered in the traditions of his home, Robinson, the Gateway to the Wheaton and the Watson country.”

– W. D. MacBride, *Whitehorse Star*, 27 September 1946

Charles McConnell was born in Prince Edward Island in 1871. According to W.D. MacBride who wrote his obituary for the *Whitehorse Star*, he made an early reputation as a weight lifter and occasionally astonished visitors to Robinson by juggling a full length of railroad rail.

McConnell headed north during the Klondike Gold Rush, working as a packer on the Stikine Trail. When gold was discovered in Atlin in 1899, he hauled a sled to the new mining camp. He then worked on the White Pass Stage Line between Whitehorse and Dawson but made time to join the rush to the Kluane region. He exhibited his Burwash Creek gold findings in the show window of a Whitehorse jeweller in the summer of 1905.

In 1907, McConnell moved to Robinson which, for nearly 40 years, was the base his for many activities. At Robinson, and a homestead six miles to the west, he grew feed, raised dairy cattle, and looked after horses for both the Geological Survey and White Pass during the off season. He acquired a sawmill and advertised timber cut to order. According to one story, he may have logged the property that later became the Annie Lake Golf Course. When Robinson had its own post office from 1908 to 1915, McConnell was the postmaster. He had mining interests including some coal claims. For recreation, he prospected and hunted with friends.

For seven years, he operated the roadhouse with Catherine Markle. They applied for adjoining homestead properties totalling 320 acres at Robinson. According to the government correspondence, this was not possible due to the previous, and later abandoned, townsite application of H.W. Vance.

Mrs. Markle moved to Skagway in 1915 and a year later McConnell married Florence Pavin in Carcross, the ceremony officiated by Archdeacon Canham. The comings and goings column of the *Star* had many items in subsequent years about visitors to Robinson and the McConnells' trips to Whitehorse, but no reference was found as to the eventual fate of Florence McConnell. The last time she was mentioned in the *Star* was May 1940. It became apparent, however, that McConnell was on his own in his last years and, at his death, his designated heir was a niece in Prince Edward Island.

He died in Whitehorse on September 22, 1946, a few days after entering hospital for an operation.

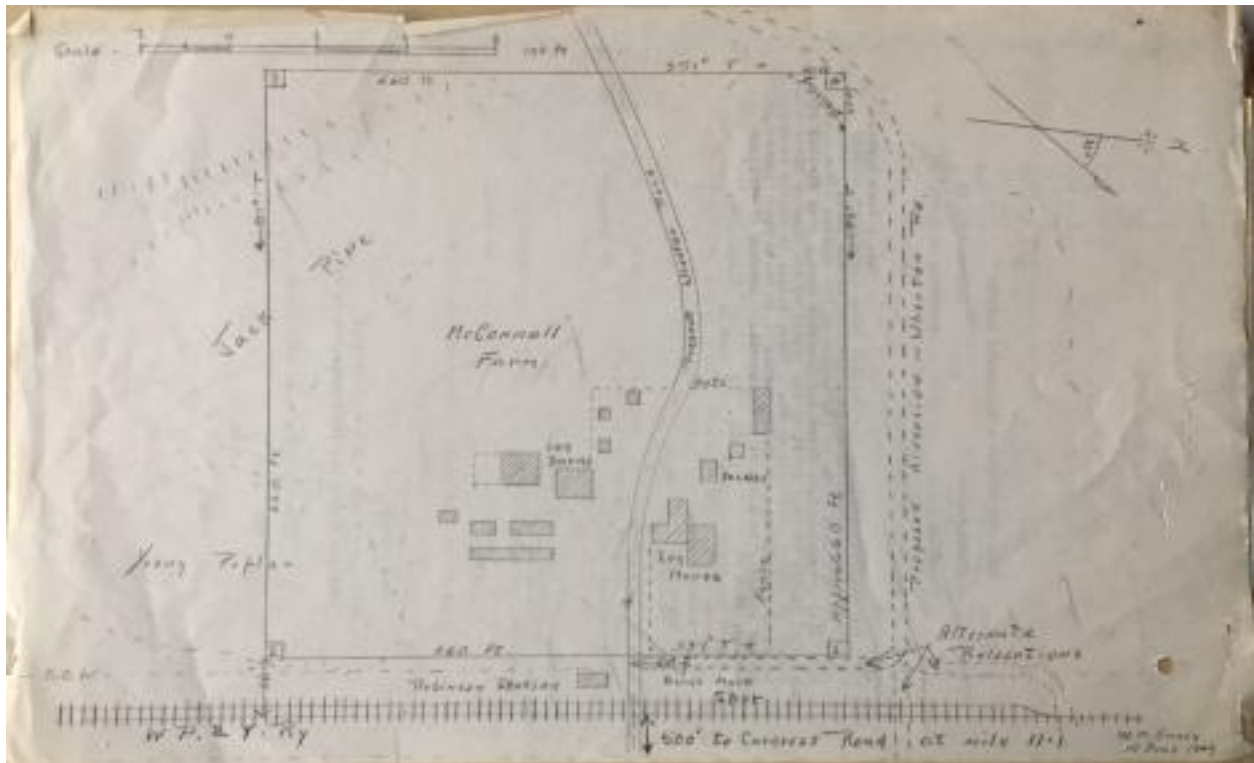

Plan of McConnell Farm and proposed route for relocation of Wheaton-Watson Road, 15 June 1947. From: YA, GOV 1674, f. 36182.

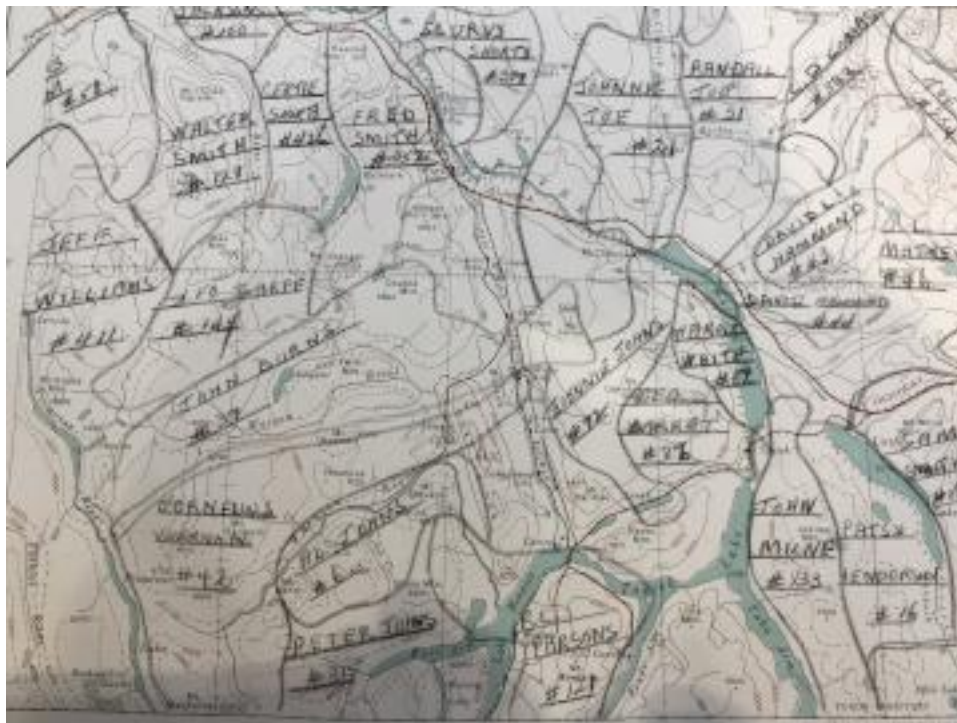

As an outfitter for 50 years, Johns relates some of his experiences. He mentions a few of the individuals from all over the world he has guided (an Austrian Count, a German Count in 1935) and an Arabian Sheik he declined. Johns comments on the game population levels presently (bears in decline, other game holding their own or doing better, wolf population controls) and historically (difficulty to find sheep in the 1920s). He also mentions his involvement in, and the reason for, establishing outfitting areas in the 1930s in cooperation with the Game Department (noting Game Director J.B. Fitzgerald and Them Kjar). His area, the second smallest, was in Southern Yukon (bordered by Teslin Lake, the Alaska Highway, [Robinson](#), Two Horse Creek, Alligator Lake, Primrose Lake, and the B.C. border). The number of assistant guides Johns had at one time topped out at 14 in the 1960s (one for each hunter by law). Dumas also queries Johns on what publications have been written about him. Johns notes that he has also guided for the RCMP and assisted with searches for downed planes.

II. Robinson Roadhouse Chronology

Note: Most of the following items were gleaned from the *Whitehorse Star*. Although the newspaper had various names throughout the years (*Weekly Star*, *Evening Star*, etc.), it was the same corporate entity and below is referred to as simply the *Whitehorse Star*. From 1906 to the 1950s, the *Star* diligently recorded a surprising number of comings and goings to this seemingly remote locale. Robinson was a hub for the miners in the Wheaton River area, hunters of big game and waterfowl, geologists checking out the mining areas or dropping off their horses to overwinter at McConnell’s Ranch, woodcutters, trappers, and visitors spending a few days with Charles and Florence McConnell. Here thousands of tonnes of ore were transferred from horse-drawn carts and later trucks to the railway. This was also the site of cattle sales, a trial, the capture of lost dogs and an escaped criminal, and even a rest stop for the mysterious Lillian Alling on her long trip from New York toward Siberia, mostly on foot.

Unfortunately, the *Star* was less diligent about recording the travels of the First Nations families in the area. Although the Robinson flag station and roadhouse were not established until the early 1900s, this area had long been a crossroads of First Nation travel routes. People travelled from Fish Lake southwest of Whitehorse overland to Robinson and from there to Tagish, Caribou Crossing and even over the mountain passes to the Pacific coast. Other routes led west to Kusawa Lake. More recently, we know that several families were hunting and trapping in this area including Kitty and Billy Smith, and the Burns family but more research is required to obtain these stories.
