What is a Socio-Economic Study?

A socio-economic study looks at the effects that a project or activity can have on people and communities.
















Goals of the Minto Mine Phase 5/6 Socio-Economic Study

Baseline

a) To describe exiting SFN economy, health, culture, traditions, lifestyles, heritage resources, and any other items important to the SFN;

Impact Assessment b) To assess how the proposed mine expansion may affect the items identified above; and

Cumulative Effects Assessment c) To assess how the proposed mine expansion may contribute to cumulative effects.



What will we do with the data?

We will review the data and the ways that we can track the effect that the Minto Mine may have on values of importance to the SFN.

For example, as jobs are important, we will look at the type and number of jobs that exist today and identify how the proposed Minto Mine Phase 5/6 expansion will affect jobs.


We will use a 'Criteria and Indicator' (C&I) Framework to do this and to try and make the project better for people, the community, and the Minto Mine.

We will share what we learn with you and include it in the Minto Mine Phase 5 /6 YESAB Application.






An Example


Data Collection and Community Meeting
