I would like to extend my thanks to the Yukon Mining Incentives Program for the decision to partially reimburse expenditures incurred during the initiation and prompt termination of our exploration project in the Upper Coal River region. The project was planned to take place over ~1 week and was to target intrusion related mineralization associated with mid Cretaceous igneous rocks that are known to produce significant tungsten and gold mineralized showings. Detailed silt and soil sampling were to accompany prospecting and cursory geophysical surveying.

Crew mobilization into the camp location occurred on June 17, 2009 and comprised Chris Davis (head geologist), Laurel Arness and Mike Burns. Upon erection of camp a young and stubborn grizzly bear entered the site around 2:00 am, June 18, 2009. Chris Davis was alerted of the bear's presence when it clawed open the fly of his personal sleeping tent. After alerting the crew, they fired bear bangers and made noise (including gunshots) in an attempt to scare the bear off. The efforts successfully moved the bear along, but did not 'scare' the bear as it returned once more shortly after.

The crew called myself via satellite phone in the morning and a demobilization was immediately organized with Kluane Airways, who had brought the crew into the camp site. By early afternoon the entire camp was torn down and the crew was on their way in preparation for other exploration work. Three photographs are included below from this project.
